

Course description: Paying special attention to the recurring motifs of expansion and frontier (geographical, technological, racial, psychological, and so on), we will study a range of fiction, non-fiction, journalism, poetry, and non-book texts. In particular, we will use our readings to support, challenge, or complicate the applicability of Theodore Roosevelt's and Frederick Jackson Turner's influential theories of American history and identity formation. Discussions will consider the role of westward expansion on the institution of slavery, Native rights, the role of women, literary genre, and the critical recognition of "American Literature" at the end of the nineteenth century.
