Course title: Narrative

Course Description: Stories are the house of memory – one room opens into another. Doors open and close. In this course, we will look at how stories enable us to live as creatures in time. We will look at a group of novels and short stories written over the past century, and episodes of a recent television drama, and our task will be to understand the subtleties of these different forms and to become alert to the ways narratives create meaning. We will try to understand the work that stories do in our lives. Students will be expected to write polished essays about the works on our list, and a portion of the course will be devoted to developing writing skills.
