**Course Title**: Critical Approaches to Literature

Course description: This challenging and yet "user-friendly" course offers a survey of contemporary literary theory from Psychoanalytic criticism to Ecocriticism, considering along the way the traditions of Marxist, Feminist, New, Reader-Response, Structural, Deconstructive, New Historical, Lesbian/Gay/Queer, and Postcolonial criticism. Our examination of these critical debates will be informed by a discussion of the aesthetic, cultural, and political priorities that continue to shape them.

In addition to weekly assigned readings on and about critical theory, we will perform an intensive study of F. Scott Fitzgerald's The *Great Gatsby* over the course of the term: we will consider how the application of a variety of critical reading practices informs our appreciation and understanding of the text, and this example will help to

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model the process by which students will select a critical approach and develop a research paper on a literary work of their choice.
