Course Title: Fiction, 1832-1900

Course description: Explores the works of a great age of fiction and its responses to moral, social and political dilemmas. At least twelve novels by such authors as Charles Dickens, the Brontës, George Eliot, Thomas Hardy, Bram Stoker, and Oscar Wilde. The course is intended to 1) familiarize students with selected major works of Victorian fiction; 2) expand interpretative skills through a wide range of comparative and cultural studies approaches to 19th Century texts and authors; and 3) focus on honing critical writing and thinking skills. All three serve to help with other courses, broadening your historical sense of literature, and polishing critical and interpretative skills.

Required Reading - With the exception of Eliot's Silas Marner (Oxford), the course texts are broadview editions and available at the UTM bookstore or, for a discount, from broadview directly:
