

Letter of Understanding between Sheridan Institute of Technology and Advanced Learning and the University of Toronto Mississauga

Introduction

This letter of understanding will serve to establish the principles, guidelines, and procedures governing the admission and assessment of selected qualified students to an Honours Bachelor of Arts (HBA) program at the University of Toronto Mississauga following the completion of a two-year General Arts and Science diploma at Sheridan Institute of Technology and Advanced Learning (Sheridan Institute).

Objectives

The objectives of this understanding include, but are not limited to:

- The establishment of this agreement between the University of Toronto Mississauga and Sheridan Institute is intended to provide qualified students from Sheridan Institute with a seamless option for continuing their education in an Honours Bachelor of Arts program at the University of Toronto Mississauga.
- Outlining the process for receiving admission and advanced standing for an Honours Bachelor of Arts program at the University of Toronto Mississauga.
- Ensuring and facilitating ongoing academic coordination and collaboration.

Terms of the Agreement

1. Admission to the Sheridan Institute General Arts and Science program will continue to be in accordance with the existing Sheridan Institute admission criteria and procedures.
2. Admission to an Honours Bachelor of Arts program at the University of Toronto Mississauga will require students in the General Arts and Science program at Sheridan Institute to achieve a CGPA of 3.0. This requirement will be reviewed annually in accordance with the admission requirements for the University of Toronto Bachelor of Arts admission requirements.
3. Upon successful completion of four full-time semesters in the General Arts and Science program at Sheridan Institute, applicants should complete the 105 application form on the Ontario Universities' Application Centre (OUAC) website.
4. Transfer credit will be awarded according to the following chart, up to a maximum of 5.0 University of Toronto Mississauga credits:

Note: Students must have achieved a mark of at least C- or 60% in the Sheridan Institute courses listed below to be considered for transfer credit. The Sheridan Institute courses listed below can only be used once toward transfer credits. The equivalencies listed below are subject to review during the life of this agreement.

This may include revisiting the assessed transfer credit equivalencies above in the event of curricular changes at either institution. This Monitoring Committee will consist of:
- The U of T Mississauga Registrar (or representative);
 - The U of T Mississauga Dean of Academics (or representative);
 - The Sheridan Institute Registrar (or representative);
 - The Sheridan Institute Dean of Academics (or representative).
