



## ART HISTORY PROGRAM

With the Art History Program in the Department of Visual Studies (DVS), you'll be able to study art and architecture with award-winning and internationally renowned faculty. Courses span the history of art from the ancient to the contemporary world, and investigate art from Europe, the Americas, Africa, and Asia.

As an Art History student, you will be trained in observation and learn about the history and methods of the discipline. You will learn to analyze visual objects, considering their form, materials and techniques, iconographies, and historical and political contexts.

You will also have the opportunity to take courses in the history, theory, and practice of curation.

Course requirements ensure that you gain a broad background in the art of three historical periods: Ancient and Medieval, Renaissance and Baroque, and Modern and Contemporary. You will also take more specialized courses focused on a single theme such as Contemporary South Asian Art, Pilgrimage, and the History of Photography. Some upper-level courses focus on student research projects, while others emphasize reading and class discussion.



### ART HISTORY COURSES

Art History faculty teach in the following areas: Medieval, Early Modern, Indigenous Canadian, South Asian, Islamic, Contemporary, Media Theory, Photography, 19th– and 20th–century European, and Curatorial Studies. Advanced courses include All Our Relations: Indigenous Land Stewardship and Art, Pilgrimage, Modern Craft, The Sculptor–Architect Gian Lorenzo Bernini, Cities in the Early Modern Muslim World, New Genres in Contemporary Art, Modern & Contemporary Art of India, and Spirit Photography.
