



ABOUT THE PLAY

In Franz Kafka's A Report To An Academy of 1917, we encountered a short story with colonial innuendos housed in the tale of an Ape captured in Gold Coast, the now Ghana, by hunting expedition team from Europe. At the heart of Kafka's text was however, the complexity of otherness and identity.

This adaptation puts 'Red Peter the Ape' in a South African context compelling him to irradiate his survival in post-apartheid existence. The fundamental structure of the story remains the container while, Red Peter's journey presents us with an opportunity to explore, through the animal gaze, the tension between self and other. This borderland between human and animal presents the insatiable desire to become, a hope for process, for progress, for change, for a way out in the world laden with racism, sexism, chauvinism, tribalism, etc.

In theatrical crafting the tension between telling and re-enactment are explored, the fourth wall is broken, the audience's insider-outsider sensibilities are tested, the emotional landscape is charged, and the physicality is absurd and the story is virtually confessional. This becomes the currency through which Kafka's Ape explores otherness, in which traditional boundaries, categories, and norms are questioned; in which beauty, harmony, and symmetry are usurped by ugliness, dissonance, and irregularity.

Kafka's Ape opens up the reality that there exists something outside of and in addition to our "normal," "typical," "wholesome" world, and that is "other". For Red Peter a feeling of being trapped becomes determinative for existential truth. The play compels one to identify and to meditate their response to other, and otherness, to interrogate how external sociological constructs and internal psychological constructs define the existential condition of self and other. This is the critical proposition of Kafka's Ape which has won numerous awards and performed worldwide.



SHORT BLURB

Kafka's Ape is a solo performance about a primate's struggle to overcome the confines of captivity. The play takes a metaphorical view on South African society. It highlights the complexities of identity in post-apartheid South Africa and in the human race in general. Red Peter, the ape, embarks on a journey ignited by finding a way out of a cage he was confined to after his capture; a journey in which he contests identity based on outward appearance. Through the journey of Red Peter the play provides a narrative that helps to question the understanding of otherness.
