

We wish to acknowledge this land on which the University of Toronto operates. 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We are delighted to invite you to the 2024/25 Theatre and Drama Studies season! Our graduating students will perform in four exciting shows on the Erindale Studio Theatre mainstage, all of which explore the relationship between past and present, between old texts and contemporary political and social concerns. Two of our shows are productions of major classics: Edward II by Christopher Marlowe, Shakespeare's contemporary and, until his early death, his closest rival; and The Threepenny Opera by Bertolt Brecht, Elisabeth Hauptmann, and Kurt Weill, one of the greatest theatrical hits of 1920s Berlin and the closest we have ever come to staging a piece of musical theatre. Our other two mainstage productions are of cutting-edge contemporary plays that both turn to the past to speak to the present: Yvette Nolan reinvents Aristophanes's *The Birds* in a 21st-century Canadian context, in our first-ever play by an indigenous author; and Charlie Josephine reimagines Joan of Arc as a non-binary queer icon in *I, Joan*, in a play that was a huge (if controversial) hit in London in 2022 and which will receive its Anglophone Canadian premiere in our production. Meanwhile, on our studio stage, the third-year students will present their Devised Project – always a celebration of theatrical creativity – and two different takes on Shakespeare's Twelfth Night.

2024 has been yet another banner year for our graduates. A small sampling: David Yee (Class of 2000) won the Siminovitch Prize in Playwriting, Canada's most significant prize for theatre artists. TDS grads had a year of unprecedented recognition at the Dora Mayor Moore Awards: most notably, Lindsey Middleton (2013) won for her performance in Tennessee Williams's Suddenly Last Summer - the second acting Dora for a TDS graduate in a row! Also nominated were Cameron Laurie and Hallie Seline (both 2011) for their performances in the Howland Company's production of *Heroes of the Fourth Turning*, Julia Nish-Lapidus (2007) for The Two Noble Kinsmen (Shakespeare BASH'd), Hailey Gillis (2013) for Natasha, Pierre & the Great Comet of 1812 (Musical Stage Company/Crow's Theatre). Chiamaka Glory (2014) for Truth (Young People's Theatre), and Reena Goze (2023) for Ladies and Gentlemen, Boys and Girls (Roseneath Theatre). Other graduates saw their plays produced on stages all over Canada, including Mark Crawford (2004), Sophia Fabiilli (2010), and Andrea Scott (1996), whose play Get That Hope is part of the 2024 season at Stratford. Paolo Santalucia (2011) was appointed Associate Artistic Director of Crow's Theatre, where he also directed The Wrong Bashir. And TDSers acted in shows on all the major stages in Canada: Qasim Khan (2008), played lead roles in Playboy of the Western World at Shaw, the Coal Mine production of Hedda Gabler, and Canadian Stage's The Inheritance, which won the Dora for Outstanding Production; this summer, he is playing Hamlet in High Park. Marissa Orjalo (2019) is enjoying her second year at Stratford, where Anthony Palermo (2023) joined her this year, and Lindsay Wu (2019) is in her second season at the Shaw Festival. Alexia Vassos (2019) played the title role in Shakespeare in the Ruff's 2023 Richard Three; Spencer Bennet (2017) and Jewell Bowry (2023) both starred in Shakespeare in Action's Otîhêw. On screen, Mercedes Morris (2015) continues as one of the stars of the show in season three of CBC's SkyMed; other grads with major recurring roles include Sara Mitich (2010), Sarah Hime (2017), Hannah Termaat (2018), George Alevizos (2019), Ben Steele Caldwell, Daniel Gravelle (both 2020), Christina Orjalo, and Daniella Dela Peña (both 2021). And On a Dark, Cold Night, the podcast Kristen Zaza (2011) writes and performs, keeps winning Canadian Podcast Awards and assorted prizes internationally.

The TDS mainstage and studio seasons give you a chance to see the next generation of adventurous Canadian theatre artists in their first professional productions. The Threepenny Opera

by Bertolt Brecht and Kurt Weill, with Elisabeth Hauptmann Translation by Simon Stephens Director: Anita La Selva October 3 – 12, Erindale Studio Theatre

Not an opera nor exactly a piece of musical theatre, but a cutting, cynical, and often grimly funny satire – with lots of songs, including such cabaret classics as "Mac the Knife" and "Pirate Jenny." Brecht, with a lot of help from Elisabeth Hauptmann, wrote the script in a few frantic weeks in 1928 Berlin, a city that was simultaneously reinventing modern gender relations and witnessing the excesses of turbocapitalism, and the play, with its raw and edgy score by Weill, preserves that helter-skelter atmosphere. A wild, merciless, utterly captivating ride!

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Charle Josephine's complete miningining of the story of Joan of Arc upset some critics when it opened in London in 2022, but was celebrated by others, and by audiences for its extraordinary, exuberant energy. This Joan is a non-binary person, fighting for their freedom as well as for France's liberry from English rule, fueled by their other belief in their mission (and its divine support) outset by a sensiti minuted establishment, but ultimately triumph and A glariously counterfactual, missingly theatrical rethinking of history by one of the most exoting volces in contemporary drama.





Aristophanes's 2400-year-old comical allegory of the relationship between humans, nature, and the Gods is refashioned as a playfully satirical examination of the relationship between First Nations and settlers in this comedy by Yvette Nolan, one of the country's most prominent indigenous theatre makers and playwrights. A play about profound questions, about land and ownership, about reconciliation and appropriation, about utopian escapism and real-life politics that wears its seriousness lightly, set in a richly imagined, song-and-dance-filled land of the birds.

by Christopher Marlowe Director: Melee Hutton March 27 – April 5, Erindale Studio Theatre

If Christopher Marlowe had not been killed at 29 in a brawl, he might have become a more canonical playwright than Shakespeare. His *Edward II* is one of the greatest examples of the English history play: ostensibly factual, drawn from authoritative sources, but populated by characters as vividly drawn as those in any of the great tragedies of that age. Edward is a fascinating figure, caught between his impossible love for another man, a desire to rule as an absolute monarch, and an aristocratic class that curbs his will at every step. One of the most complex political plays in the repertoire, driven by what Ben Jonson called the "mighty line" of Marlowe's inimitably punchy blank verse.





The Classical Project: Twelfth Night



by William Shakespeare Directors: Cameron Grant and David Matheson October 17 - 26, MiST Theatre

Twelfth Night, or, in one of Shakespeare's most delightfully throwaway titles, *What you Will*, is maybe his most brilliant comedy, a riot of confused loves and identities, as hilarious as it is sad – a play that ends in marriages and loneliness in equal measure. In this studio production, two casts drawn from the third year of the TDS program explore the play in two different versions of the text, guided by two different directors. See both! Compare and contrast!







Director: Rachel Blair February 27 – March 1, MiST Theatre

For their second show of the year, the third-year students of the TDS program devise a show made up entirely of original work, under the guidance of an established director. They choose a theme and their own approach to the material. They may write songs; they will probably choreograph dance and movement sequences. The Devised Project is always a showcase of theatrical collaboration and exuberant creativity.



Its graduates can be seen all over Canada, from Bard on the Beach in Vancouver to the Neptune Theatre in Halifax, on all the major Toronto stages (from Canadian Stage and Crow's to Soulpepper and the Tarragon), at the Shaw and Stratford Festivals, and on screen in shows on CBC, Crave, Netflix, and elsewhere. TDS graduates have also gone on to award-winning careers as directors and playwrights, and have founded some of the most successful independent Toronto theatre companies of recent years. Our Studio and Mainstage seasons offer an exciting opportunity to see these future leading lights of Canadian theatre in their first professional productions, under the guidance of established directors.
