SDG Action Mapping

Aligned over 395 of Conservation Halton's 2024 Momentum Action Items with relevant UN Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), ensuring organizational objectives are in line with global sustainability standards.

Comperator Analysis

Conducted an in-depth analysis of sustainability best practices from other Conservation Authorities (CAs), regulatory agencies, municipalities, and environmental organizations to identify opportunities for improvement.

Departmental Roundtables

Facilitated a series of roundtables with Objective Owners from seven departments, fostering discussions on current and future sustainability initiatives across the organization.

Sustainability Strategy Development

Drafted a comprehensive action plan to establish a sustainability strategy, including options for organizational-level reporting and mechanisms to track progress.

Senior Leadership Report

Contributed to a detailed report for the Senior Leadership Team (SLT), providing an analysis of industry-wide sustainability initiatives, Conservation Halton's current efforts, and recommendations for future directions.



Learning Outcomes

People and Processes

learned that integrating sustainability into an organization isn't just about creating strategies—it's about bringing people along slowly, listening to their perspectives, and **fostering a shared sense of purpose**.

I learned the importance of *patience* in navigating approvals, where even small decisions require oversight, and major ones go to the Board, teaching me to balance ambition with practicality.

Strategic Growth

Another key insight was understanding the financial constraints many organizations face when implementing sustainability. It's not enough to highlight the benefits—you have to bring actionable, cost-effective solutions to the table.

Conducting a comperator analysis pushed me to think bigger and more strategically about what Conservation Halton could achieve. It showed me how we could position ourselves to lead in sustainability.

Most importantly, I learned that sustainability is <u>already happening</u> within the organization; sometimes, it's just about framing those efforts in a way that resonates both internally and externally.
