LINGUISTICS (HBA)

Department of Language Studies

Linguistics is the scientific study of language. At the heart of linguistics is understanding language in the mind: What is the nature of the unconscious knowledge that humans have of language? How do we process this knowledge? How do children acquire language? How do languages vary? What properties are common to all human languages? How does language influence the way we interact with each other? Our programs in Linguistics will give you insight into one of the most defining features of being human: the ability to communicate through language. Our programs provide a strong foundation in the core aspects of human language: sounds (phonetics and phonology), words (morphology), sentences (syntax), and meaning (semantics). The world-class expertise of our faculty also allow students to apply their foundational knowledge via courses and research opportunities to areas such as how language varies depending on group, situation, or region (sociolinguistics), how language changes over time (historical linguistics), how people use language in context (pragmatics and discourse analysis), how people acquire or learn language, and how it is taught. Students can also investigate how to model aspects of language (theoretical and computational linguistics) and how people process language (psycholinguistics).

Skills developed in Linguistics

To be competitive in the job market, it is essential that you can explain your skills to an employer. Visit the Career Centre to learn how to articulate and market the following skills:

Technical: knowledge of the various abstract structural subsystems of human language; knowledge of how humans produce and process language; how babies acquire language(s); how language(s) are learned as an adult; how it varies and changes through space and time.

Research: Experience with handson experimental methods; collecting data; quantifying data; analysing data; application of data to theoretical or computational; engaging in the development of linguistic theory.

Analytical: Analytic reasoning; critical thinking; methods of argumentation; formulating hypotheses; generating predictions; making careful observations; gaining practice with qualitative and quantitative analytical techniques.

Communication and interpersonal:

Proficiency in oral and written expression; communicating complex information to a variety of audiences; awareness of how language is modulated according to social contexts; awareness of and respect for linguistic and cultural diversity.

Admission to UTM

All program areas require an Ontario Secondary School Diploma, or equivalent, with six Grade 12 U/M courses, or equivalent, including English. The admission average is calculated with English plus the next best five courses. The approximate average required for admission is mid- to high-70s. More information is available at

NOTE: During the application process, applicants will select the Humanities admissions category, but will not officially be admitted to a formal program of study (Specialist, Major, and/or Minor) until after first year.

Sneak Peek

How are words formed? What is their internal structure? This is the domain of morphology, and you can learn about it in LIN231H5. Have you ever noticed how the sentences you create are formed according to strict rules? Learn about this rule system in LIN232H5 *Syntactic Patterns*! How do we derive meaning from the units of language? How do units of meaning combine to make larger meanings? How do we account for meaning we can't hear? These mysteries are revealed in LIN237H5 *Semantics*.

Are you curious about how language can vary and change according to our age, gender, ethnicity, and the social dynamics of different situations? Check out how in LIN256H5 *Sociolinguistics*. What about the mystery of how babies acquire language or how the human mind processes language input? You'll be introduced to this field of inquiry in JLP285H5 *Language*, *Mind*. & *Brain*.
